



Notice of Public Consultation Centres, Oxford County

Oxford County is seeking feedback on a proposed backflow prevention program and draft bylaw. In Report No. PW 2022-35, County Council authorized staff to undertake a public consultation and engagement campaign to seek input on the proposed Backflow Prevention Program and draft By-law in 2023. Public and stakeholder consultation is a key element of the program development and review process.

In keeping with these commitments, Public Consultation Centres (PCCs) are to be held in each Area Municipality as noted below. The PCCs will consist of a presentation by the County project team followed by a question and answer period.

Notice of the PCCs will be advertised to commercial, industrial, institutional, and select multiresidential property owners in advance through local newspapers and social media. In addition, mail outs were delivered to industrial, institutional, and commercial users that may be impacted by the proposed by-law making them aware of their ability to comment on the program during this review period.

Further to the PCCs, public opportunities to leave comments and ask questions will be available through the Speak-Up, Oxford! project web page and remain active until the public consultation period closes on April 6, 2023.

Oxford County Proposed Backflow Prevention By-law

Oxford County is seeking feedback on a proposed Backflow Prevention Program (BPP). The BPP will further protect the municipal drinking water from potential contamination (backflow event) by private side businesses and properties that are connected to the water distribution system. Backflow events can significantly impact residents, businesses, water quality and pose a health risk to consumers. Implementing a BPP will further strengthen the multi-barrier approach the County uses to protect its municipal drinking water system.

Why do we need backflow prevention?

Under normal operating conditions water flows from the municipal drinking water system into businesses and homes through private service connections. Backflow can occur when changes in pressure cause water to reverse this normal direction of flow-- pushing or pulling water from within a private-service back into the municipal drinking water system.

A cross connection is any connection between the municipal drinking water system and a source of contamination. Water that backflows through a cross connection poses a hazard to the municipal drinking water system. This risk is mitigated through the installation of a backflow prevention device (BPD), which isolates the water supply of private services to prevent the reversal of flow.

About the Backflow Prevention Program

While the Ontario Building Code may require some properties to install a backflow prevention device (BPD) at the time of construction, the OBC has limitations that may exclude some properties that pose a risk to the municipal drinking water system. A formalized BPP will address these concerns and further guide:

- Which properties will require a BPD
- Types of acceptable BPD
- Testing and inspection frequency of BPD
- Qualifications for inspectors of BPD
- Requirements to submit test reports to the County
- Non-compliance infractions

Oxford County is taking a proactive approach to safeguard its municipal drinking water systems. The proposed by-law will apply to select industrial, commercial, and institutional properties, as well as select multi-residential properties, based on their moderate or high risk hazard classification under the CSA B64 series standard.

Public and technical agency consultation will be fundamental in developing the BPP, and members of the public are invited and encouraged to comment on the project at any time during the Study.

The Project Team is hosting in person Public Consultation Centres (PCCs) in each area municipality between January 31 and March 23, 2023. PCCs will be advertised through local media, social media, and Speak Up, Oxford! at www.oxfordcounty.ca/backflow prior to the event.

The comment period for the Backflow Prevention Program PCC closes on Thursday April 6, 2023.

- Gobles CN Bridge It has been determined that the bridge deck needs to be replaced.

 2023. CN is looking into a better way to control traffic over the bridge until the end of
 construction. Looking at hydro powered traffic lights.
- Princeton Pond Expansion project The new storm water structures have been installed and the excavation of the pond has started. Staff continues to work with KSmart and local residence on finding suitable dump sites for the excess material. We are also working on finishing the tender for this year's road reconstruction and waiting on final approval from CN for the boring under the tracks.

County Shared Service/Road Association/Training

- Shared Services meeting The service sharing committee met in EZT in January. Tony
 Hymers from the OPP attended our meeting to discuss the upcoming half load season
 and what the Townships can do to help the OPP with enforcement. We are also starting
 to plan Book 7 training for all public works staff.
- Road Association The next meeting will be March 9.
- AORS The BOD will be meeting in February to discuss the 2023 operating budget and review the 2023 training plans. The AORS AGM will be held during the Good Roads conference in April.

Other

- In January we have seen above average temperatures with rain and freezing rain

 doing patching, light grading of bad areas, ice blading and sanding and salting. During
 some warmer dry weather, we were able to clean out some ditches as well. Staff
 continues to work with what mother nature throughs at us the best we can.
- Met with suppliers to discuss prices for 2023 budget and availability.
- Coordinated the construction of the Romano storm water pond site in Princeton.
- Working with the Drainage Superintendent on finding suitable dump sites for the excess soil from the Princeton Drain project.
- Working with KSmart and Drainage Superintendent on the next phases of the Princeton project.
- Staff is still continuing to meet with land owners at outdoor sites to discuss ditch or road issues.

Background:

At its regular meeting on August 12, 2021 Council considered a request from the owner of 16 Mechanic Street North, Drumbo to purchase a portion of property adjacent to theirs which is presently owned by the municipality. At that meeting a resolution was passed declaring property surplus and directing staff to begin the process of disposing of the property.

At the December 21, 2022 meeting of Council staff brought forward report CAO-22-27 which recommended that Council pass the necessary by-law to proceed with the sale. At that time proceeding with the sale. At that time a concern was brought forward regarding the suitability of the land for building since much of the property consists of fill placed there when the Village was reconstructed back in the 1980's. In light of this, staff were directed to have further discussions with the intended purchaser regarding the property.

Analysis/Discussion:

Prior to proceeding with the sale of Township property on Mechanic Street staff were instructed to have further discussions with the intended purchaser regarding the fill placed on the site in the 1980's. When contacted that individual indicated that it was not their intention to build on this parcel of land acquired from the Township. It would simply be an addition to the property abutting theirs. "The extra land was more or less needed for the side or rear yard setback." They still wish to proceed with the sale.

Staff then contacted our lawyer to discuss the sale. We were advised that a clause should be inserted into the agreement indicating that the issue has been disclosed to the Buyer and that they agree to accept the property. That clause will also indicate that the Buyer agrees to disclose this issue to any subsequent purchaser prior to a sale. He further suggested that an indemnification clause in favour of the Township be inserted.

Financial Considerations:

The Township Fees and Charges by-law places a value of \$2.03 / sq ft on serviced land owned by the municipality. The total area of the property to be transferred is 4,108 sq ft so that equates to a value of \$8,339.24.

That Robert Swayze be appointed as the Township's Integrity Commissioner and Closed Meeting Investigator effective February 1, 2023; and,

That the Mayor and Clerk be authorized to execute the necessary agreements related thereto

Background:

Section 239.2 of the Municipal Act authorizes the municipality to appoint an investigator to investigate in an independent manner any complaint with respect to a meeting, or part of a meeting, that was closed to the public for Council or any of its' committees. Should council not appoint an investigator, and should there be a complaint, then the Ombudsman would investigate any complaint.

Section 223.3 of the Municipal Act authorizes the municipality to appoint an Integrity Commissioner whose role is to promote accountability and transparency in municipal governance. The Integrity Commissioner's role is to:

- Keep officials aware of the requirements of the Code;
- Respond to requests from members of Council, Boards or Committees for advice regarding their obligations under the Code of Conduct and compliance;
- Conduct confidential inquiries and investigations into alleged contraventions of the Code, make findings with respect to the alleged contravention are recommend penalties to Council, where the Integrity Commissioner finds that the code has been breached; and

Report to Council on the activities of the office.

Analysis/Discussion:

For the past ten years, the County of Oxford, and many of the area municipalities have retained Gregory Stewart, who is with the Law Firm of Donnelly & Murphy to act as the closed meeting investigator. Since 2019 Mr. Stewart has also acted as Integrity Commissioner for those municipalities in the County.

In 2022, Mr. Stewart notified Oxford County and the participating area municipalities that he would be cutting back on Integrity Commissioner commitments. The Township's agreement with Mr. Stewart ended on December 31, 2022, but Mr. Stewart agreed to a short extension of his contract to cover the municipalities until a replacement was found. As such, the Township must appoint an Integrity Commissioner and Closed Meeting Investigator following the termination of the agreement for the years 2023-2026.

Oxford County and the area municipalities (excluding Woodstock) agreed to the potential joint hiring of a new Integrity Commissioner and/or Closed Meeting Investigator. The County spearheaded the Integrity Commissioner / Closed Meeting Investigator search and issued an RFQ in November, which closed on December 9, 2022. As a result of that search it was recommended that Robert Swayze be appointed as Integrity Commissioner/Closed Meeting Investigator.

Mr. Swayze has specialized in municipal law for the entirety of his career both as an employee of two municipalities (Markham and Vaughan) and in private practice. As Integrity Commissioner since 2008, he has served more than 60 municipalities, conducting over 150 investigations. He has advised councils and councillors extensively and interpreted Ontario municipal codes of conduct and municipal statutes including, the Municipal Act, 2001, the Municipal Conflict of Interest Act, and the Public Enquiries Act. Mr. Swayze will provide the level of service, including appropriate response times, to the satisfaction of the Clerks and members of Council.

Financial Considerations:

 Mr. Swayze requires an annual retainer of \$1,000. This retainer includes three hours of time per year. There is an hourly rate of \$280 for time spent in excess of the three hours covered under the retainer fee.
