Background:

The original drain was constructed in 1976 and there was an emergency repair in 1978 as requested by MTO

After a request for maintenance in fall of 2020 of the Hughes Drain by Forest Estates (394075 Ontario Ltd). The township did maintenance the open ditch by removing the dead tree and brush in the open ditch. Forest Estates was also concerned that the tile upstream of the open ditch was damaged or not functioning properly. There was major ponding of water in the area where Forest Estate tile outlets was connected to the Hughes Drain. This was affecting the drain outlets on their property. Upon investigation of the existing tile, it was found that the tile installed in 1978 has major settlement and is going require major repair. The existing assessment schedule does not allow for proper assessing of this work to be charged to the 401. So, I believe that the Township should appoint an Engineer under Section 78 of the Drainage Act to determine what is the best repair required and a proper assessment schedule for this repair and maintenance.

The UTRCA have been notified of council intention to proceed with the appointment of an Engineer under Section 78 of the Drainage Act for the Hughes Drain, that was accepted at the January 12 2022 council meeting.

Analysis/Discussion:

Therefore, in accordance with Section 78 of the Drainage Act Council may appoint an Engineer to prepare a report in accordance with Section 78 and Section 8 of the Act

Financial Considerations:

The cost of all municipal drain are assessed to effected landowner in the area of the drainage works.

Background:

Township staff was contacted by residence that live along Township Road 12 between Oxford Road 22 & Oxford Road 8 with concerns about speeding and that more trucks are using the road to access the gravel pit. They requested that this section of road have the speed limit reduced to 60 km and that the road be made a No truck route. This would leave the gravel pit the ability to only access the pit from Oxford Road 22.

Analysis/Discussion:

In order to get accurate information staff did 2 studies. The first study we deployed our speed signs for a 10-day period. These signs will track the number of vehicles, the speed these vehicles are driving and will also break it down by the time of day. The results of the study showed that there was an average of 48 vehicles per day, the average speed was 54 km with the highest vehicle at 92 km. The time of day when the most speeding occurred was 6 am – 8 am & 4 pm – 7 pm. The police use what is called the 85 percentile to determine if speed enforcement is warranted. They take the 85% of vehicles and divide that by the total violations. On Township Road 12 it worked out to 14% or approximately 2.9 vehicles per day were speeding. This is very low and would not warrant any police action. In order to get a good comparison and to take the bias out that people see the speed signs flashing their speed and automatically slow down, staff deployed our speed spy devices. These are small black boxes that can be mounted on a sign and record the same information without flashing the speed being traveled. We left these out for a 10-day period as well. The results from this study determined and average of 88 vehicles a day, the average speed was 53 km with the highest

violation being 118 km. The 85 percentile was still 14% with the average of 6 vehicles a day speeding. Again, with these results, they are considered low and would not require any speed enforcement measures by the OPP.

Staff also takes into account when making these recommendations, who is using this road section, what type of vehicles are using the road and we also look at the human element which is the people that live on the road. Township Road 12 is a gravel road, there are working farms and fields along this road, meaning that slow moving vehicles use this road. As it is inhabited, residence walk along the road, ride their bikes and families should be able to be out in their yards without any worries or safety concerns. Staff has heard from many residences along the road that they are concerned because it is not a flat road it has many little hills and valleys and are concerned of not being seen or meeting other vehicles coming up a blind rise, they also have concerns that the added truck traffic will create more dust. Some of the houses are close to the road and have complained about the ground shaking.

Staff also has to look at the gravel pit and ensure that they have the resources they require to be successful. The Bright pit has been closed or had limited activity for the last few years. It has since been sold and the new owners have plans to get it running again. This will naturally have an affect on Township Road 12. Staff has met with the owners of the pit and discussed the situation of using Township Road 12. They understand the concerns of the neighbors and want to be good neighbors, they have offered material to improve the road. They will try and us Oxford Road 22 as much as possible, however using Township Road 12 at times will be needed when it makes the best business sense.

After speaking with many parties involved and reviewing the data collected staff makes the following recommendations. The speed limit along Township Road 12 between Oxford Road 22 & Oxford Road 8 be reduced to a maximum of 60 km. This will slow traffic down, which should lesson the vibration of passing vehicles, help reduce the dust created. The Township will also monitor the dust closely and reapply dust suppressant if it is deemed necessary. The slower speed should also make pedestrians, cyclists and others near the road feel safer. Staff does not recommend moving forward with the request to make Township Road 12 a No truck route. The Township maintains all of our roadways for all to use. I believe with the lower speed limit, the road improvements, improved dust control and the gravel trucks only using when necessary is the right course of action at this time.

Civil Marriage Services

Recommendation:

That Report DC-22-01 be received as information; and,

That Council re-add a fee for Civil Marriage Services offsite during evening and weekends as well as a fee for rehearsal attendance to the 2022 Fees & Charges.

Purpose:

To provide civil marriage services post-pandemic.

Background:

At the August 5th, 2015 Meeting of Council, the Council at the time passed a by-law to authorize the Clerk and his/her delegate to solemnize marriages.

For 5 years we offered Civil Marriage Services both off and on site, during office hours or afterhours during weekends at staff's discretion based on their availability.

In 2020 staff decided to no longer offer civil marriage services off site on weekends due to the pandemic and staff availability.

In 2015, staff conducted 1 marriage, offsite on a weekend.

In 2016, staff conducted 7 marriages, 2 on site during office hours and 5 offsite on weekends.

In 2017, staff conducted 9 marriages, all offsite on weekends.

In 2018, staff conducted 7 marriages, 1 on site during office hours and 6 offsite on weekends.

In 2019, staff conducted 1 marriage, offsite on a weekend (Maternity leave began mid-March).

In 2020, staff conducted 8 marriages, all on site during office hours.

In 2021, staff conducted 4 marriages, all on site during office hours.

In total, 37 marriages have been conducted through Blandford-Blenheim since fall 2015.

Analysis/Discussion:

Staff are proposing to offer off-site civil marriage services again, now that the pandemic is something we are going to be living with, and the majority of individuals are vaccinated.

Staff are proposing to offer a off-site civil services during weekends providing these services to an industry that will likely be in high demand in 2022 and beyond due to back log from the pandemic. Staff will book services at their discretion, based on availability and still respecting a healthy work-like balance.

Staff are suggesting the previous fee of \$350.00 plus HST be applied, with a new fee for rehearsals, being \$50.00 plus HST.

Staff are proposing to be remunerated \$250.00 per service plus the full rehearsal fee. It would be paid out via regular payroll. The Township would retain \$100.00 per service off site. The fee for onsite office hours services is \$250.00 plus HST, of which the Township retains all.

Financial Implications:

 $8 \times 100 = 800$ revenue from offsite weekend weddings, if the maximum number of services are booked in a year.

Revenue varies for on-site services from year to year.

Background:

The chart below is a summary of all qualifying organizations that have submitted a 2022 Council Grant & Subsidy Application. The total of all 2022 qualifying grant & subsidy requests is \$5,000.

On February 10, 2016, the following resolution was passed by Council:

"That Council establish a budget cap of up to \$10,000 as the total annual maximum amount available through the Municipal Grants and Subsidy Program; and,

That the annual allocation to each organization receiving funding through the Municipal Grants and Subsidy Program be limited to a maximum of up to \$1,000 per organization."

The Applications were provided to Council separately to respect the organizations' privacy.

The Township passed Development Charges By-law 2148-2019 on August 7, 2019. Section 13 of the By-law establishes the authority to adjust the development charges set out in Schedule B of the by-law annually on April 1, each year, without amendment to the by-law, in accordance with the most recent twelve month change in the Statistics Canada Quarterly, "Construction Price Statistics".

Analysis/Discussion:

The Township has the ability to alter the development charges to accommodate for inflation. This ability is contained in Section 13 of the current By-law. The following table illustrates the Development Charges Currently in place compared to the Charges that will come into effect when the charges are indexed in accordance with the Construction Price Index:
